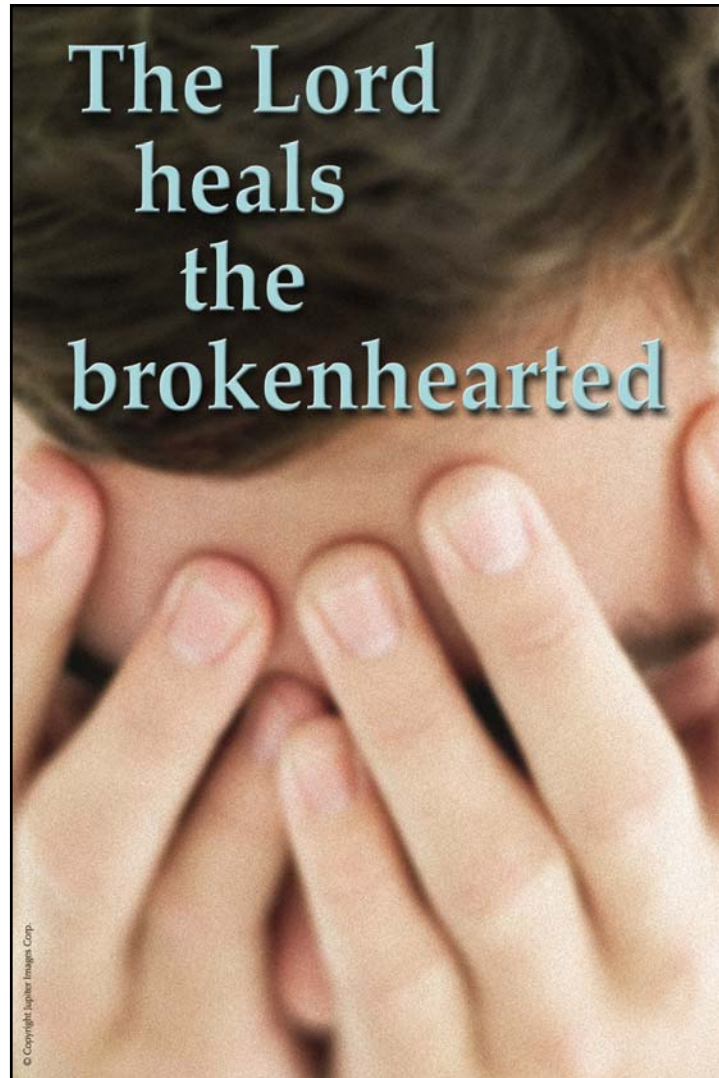

Churches Of the East in Our Midst

Lines of Communication

Well, there's a new church in town. We have three Catholic churches in Northbrook: two Roman rite and one Chaldean rite...but all three are Catholic.

Why so many "rites"? Well the Church developed along the lines of the devolution of the Roman Empire that eventually had an Emperor in the East and one in the West. Parallel to this was a language split where Latin became the primary common language in the West and in the East Greek. The Western church used Greek until the mid 5th century. It is the original language of the scriptures, the liturgy, and the first seven ecumenical councils. In the West, the primary rite became the Roman Rite although it had many variations in Hibernia (Ireland), Gaul (France), Iberia (Spain) and Italia (Italy) to name a few. In Italy there was also the *Ambrosian* Rite in Milan (named after St. Ambrose). In Spain there was the *Mozarabic* Rite. One of the outcomes of the Council of Trent in response to the Reformation was a uniform Roman Rite which was in use in the Western Catholic Church from 1575 to 1964, when we began the renewal of the liturgy and the shift from Latin to modern languages and the *Novus Ordo* (New Order of Mass).



Now let's turn to the Eastern Churches. The first thing to remember is that the development of the rites was separate and distinct from the eventual breaks or schisms that occurred both in the East and the West. The end result is that for almost all of the various rites of the Church there is both a Catholic and Orthodox/Oriental tradition.

For the most part the various rites developed around major urban settings of the Eastern portion of the Roman Empire: **Alexandria** (Mediterranean port city of Egypt), **Antioch** (major city of Syria), **Constantinople** (capital of the Eastern Roman Empire...modern day Istanbul), and **Armenia** as a result of the spread of Christianity.

Each of these major areas became in turn missionary centers spreading the faith even farther. The best known to most of us is that of the *Byzantine* Rite (named after Byzantium an alternative name to **Constantinople**). This rite was taken by missionaries from the mother church into Greece, Russia, Hungary, Georgia, Bulgaria, Albania, Romania, Slovakia, to name but a few. Today there are both Byzantine Catholic and Byzantine Orthodox churches for each of these national groups, as well as others as the rite spread throughout the world.

Out of **Alexandria** developed the Coptic Rite of Egypt which in turn spread into Ethiopia and the development of the Ethiopic Rite. From **Antioch** in Syria came two traditions: one called West Syrian and the other East Syrian. From **West Syria** developed the Syrian Rite, the *Malankarese* of India, and the *Maronite* Rite of Lebanon. From **East Syria** developed the **Chaldean Rite of modern Iraq** and the *Malabarese* Rite of Kerala State., India. So our new Catholic neighbors are Chaldean Rite Catholics who have lived here for generations and those who are recent Iraqi immigrants.

Here in Chicago we have one Melkite, one Romanian, seven Ukrainian (one is cathedral), three Syro-Malabar (one is a cathedral), one Syro-Malankar parish and now three Eastern Catholic Chaldean Rite parishes. Welcome!!

Adding Names to the Parish Sick List

It has always been the policy of Our Lady of the Brook Parish to offer you an opportunity to pray for those parishioners who are ill and in need of our prayers. However, this sometimes conflicts with the issue of privacy much like the issues faced by hospitals, health institutions, and certainly by other parishes. We cannot (by law) publicly let our parish community know the health status of any of our members without their permission. We wish to offer our parish community the opportunity to pray for those who are ill - but we must also be cognizant of the fact that all members of our parish are entitled to their privacy in this regard.

So, names for the sick list spoken at Mass and placed in the Bulletin have to be called in by the person who is ill, or by a member of their family and permission has to be given in order to publicize the name. *Names on the bulletin sick list can remain there as long as the person is ill.* Please inform the parish of any changes in the person's health, as our list tends to get "additions" but few "deletions", although the person has recovered.

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

The story of Job seems at first hearing to be an extension of February’s gloom into the liturgy. The monumental suffering of a good man is so horrific that the laments of the front page of modern newspapers barely measure up. The whole story is not long to tell, but its resolution is of great comfort. We can trace in its plot the stirrings of a belief in an afterlife, and in God’s great power to right every wrong and raise human beings from suffering.

In the Gospel, we see the fulfillment of these longings in the hand of Jesus, grasping an ill woman by the hand and raising her up to vibrant life. Peter’s mother-in-law becomes her best self, attentive to her guests, providing hospitality, the warmth of her laughter, the delights of her kitchen. Last week, at Candlemas, candles were blessed, including baptismal candles for some not yet born. Today is a day to check the fragile flame of your own baptismal candle. Against February’s customary lethargy, its background whines and ailments, the liturgy summons us to life, grasps us by the hand, and sends us to serve in Christ’s name.
