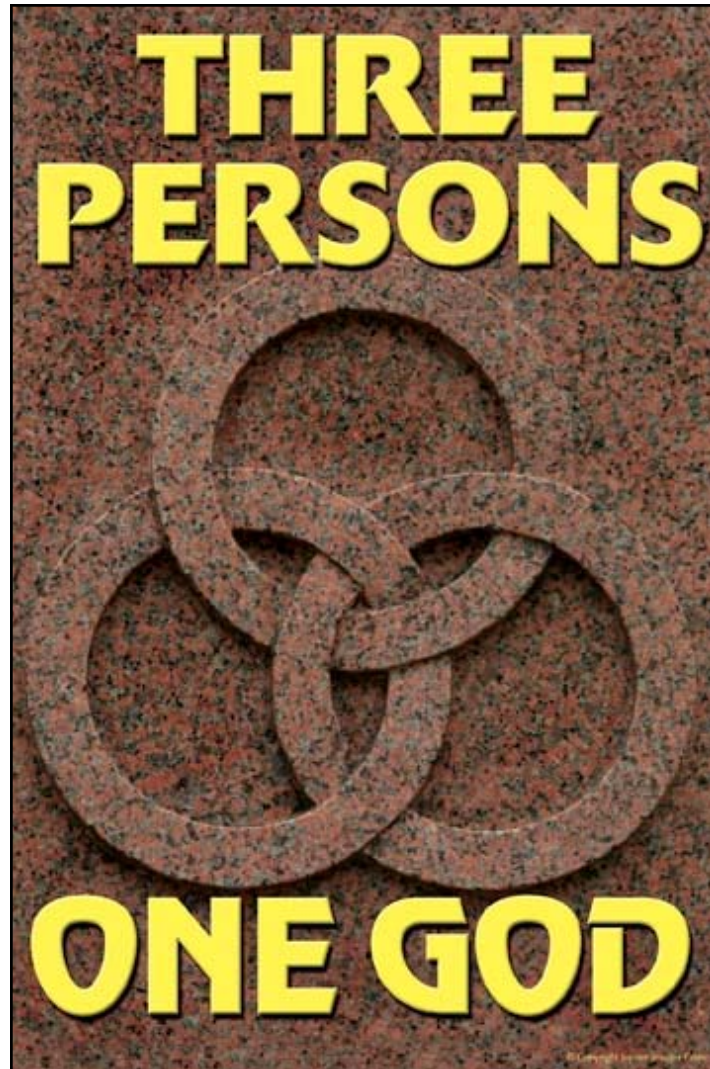

Well, there goes Easter Season. Once again we enter the Ordinary Time of the year although with the solemnities of Trinity Sunday and the Body and Blood of Christ (formerly two separate observances, the better known of which is *Corpus Christi*) the Sunday schedule doesn't return to the Ordinary calendar for a couple weeks.

Face it. In our daily lives we look forward to holidays: Easter, Thanksgiving, Christmas and all the others; but we're so very glad to see them go, just so our lives can get back to normal.

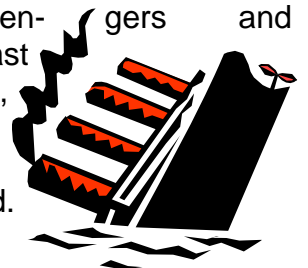
"Normal" is, of course, a relative state of being. If there are infants in the house "normal" is one thing. School age children bring another "normal" condition. Parents with adolescents in the house experience a different "normal". When the extra bedrooms are vacated and turned into TV rooms, dens, home offices, or whatever, a new "normalcy" presents itself. Then the converted bedroom gets reconverted to its former use when someone becomes seriously ill – what is "normal"? Finally, perhaps, a spouse dies and living alone in that house just isn't "normal".

"Normal?" "Ordered?" Well, let's see. How about, "Thy kingdom come, thy will be done on earth as it is in heaven"? Isn't that well ordered? Isn't that normal? Ordinary Time – the time to do the work of being a follower of Christ. Hmmm.

For a different look at "order" keep on reading!

In ancient Egypt the role of Pharaoh was not only to lead in battle and to govern but also to maintain balance, or order, in society: keep the wheels well oiled if you will. This order was called *Maat*. As long as the Nile flooded yearly, the crops were harvested, the armies victorious, and the population reasonably content everyone agreed the *Maat* was being maintained. (The biblical plagues as recounted in the Book of Exodus would cause serious questioning about Pharaoh's ability to maintain *Maat*, but that's another column.) Upon death, the Pharaoh became Horus, the Falcon God: as such he continued to maintain *Maat* on the cosmic level. Segue to...

A widely reported news item last week was the death notice of Millvina Dean. Miss Dean was all of eight weeks old as her first trans-Atlantic voyage was cut short by an iceberg that was rude enough to rip a hole in the bottom of Cunard Line's *Titanic* on April 14th, 1912. Miss Dean survived as did her mother and brother. Her father perished along with some 1,500 other passengers and crew members. She was the youngest passenger aboard and was also the last of the survivors of that event. Miss Dean's date of death was May 31st, 2009. Not so widely reported was the interesting fact that the *Titanic* was launched on May 31st, 1911 – 98 years to the date before Miss Dean's death. Somewhere a falcon preens its feathers knowing that *Maat* has been maintained.

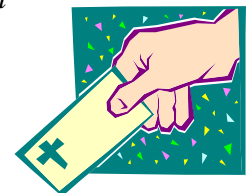

“Bulletin Building Blocks” - Most Holy Trinity

TREASURES FROM OUR TRADITION

One of the great treasures of the Eastern tradition is the icon of the Holy Trinity by the Russian iconographer Andrei Rublev in the 1400s. The Trinity is symbolized by the three travelers to the tent of Abraham and Sarah. They are seated at a table blessing a cup of wine, under the oak of Mamre. If you look closely, you will see a sacrificed calf in the chalice, reminding the viewer of the cross. The table, prepared for eating and tilted toward the viewer, is an invitation to the Eucharist. From left to right, each figure is keyed to a person of the Trinity. Like all icons, this image is theology in art. The persons are equal in proportion and dignity, they all carry staffs to symbolize their power, and are shown with golden wings and halos. Today, the best place to see Rublev’s work is the Holy Trinity Cathedral, at the heart of the vast Holy Trinity monastery about an hour from Moscow. After decades of persecution, it is now once again a living monastery, a world heritage site, and the spiritual home of Russian Orthodoxy. A Google visit is highly recommended today!

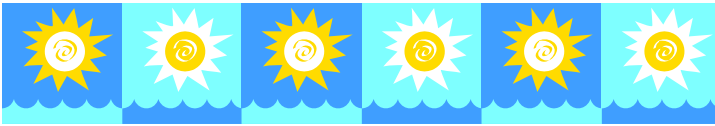

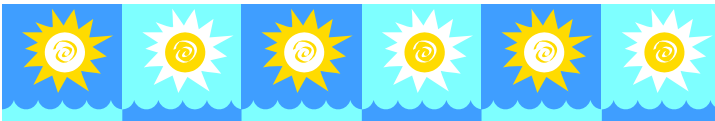


Career Help

Concert News

An 800th anniversary is somewhat rare. To celebrate the milestone of the founding of the Franciscan Order, Chiesa Nuova, a not-for-profit Franciscan ministry for the performing arts in Chicago will present "A Celebration of Hope and Peace" at **7:30 p.m. Friday and Saturday, June 26 and 27** at Lund Auditorium in the Performing Arts Center, Dominican University, 7900 Division St., River Forest, IL. Performing will be world-renowned bass-baritone Alan Held, mezzo-soprano Stacy Eckert, the Ars Viva Symphony Orchestra, and the 40-voice New Classic Singers.

The concert will consist of three major works: "Prayer for Peace" by Chicagoan Fr. Robert Hutmacher, O.F.M., "Five Mystical Songs" by Ralph Vaughn Williams, and "Dialogue of Francis and Clare" by Fr. Hutmacher. The featured work will be the oratorio "Dialogue of Francis and Clare," which tells the story of a period after Francis experienced the Stigmata in 1224, a story of healing and mystical prayer between two people consumed by the love of God.

The story of this work is Fr. Hutmacher's interpretation of one of the world's classic stories of a love rooted in God, medieval mystique, and human passion for life. "Dialogue of Francis and Clare' may help the listener to discover our common journey to God," said Fr. Hutmacher.
